## **April Tour Summary**

When: Thursday, April 28

Our tour of the Electric Works project (Phase 1) was given by Cory Miller of Elevatus Architecture. After talking about the history and scope of the project, we proceeded to what will become the Welcome center of the campus. From there we toured the Fort Wayne Community School's STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics) High School. This area was nearest to completion of all the buildings we saw and is scheduled to open this fall at full enrollment. Next, we moved to what will be Do-It-Best Corp's headquarters (space for around 500 people total – offices only, no warehouse space) and were treated to some excellent views from the roof. The roof will feature a terrace area for parties and it was interesting to learn that while the floors of this old industrial facility were built to withstand seriously heavy loads, the load capacity of the roof was similar to other buildings and not necessarily strong enough to support a party terrace at full occupancy, so extra support had to be added. That fact also put to rest the rumor that during WWII, the rooves of these buildings could have been flooded to look like lakes from above - had German bombers made it as far as Fort Wayne. After leaving

there, we proceeded east on Dynamo Alley (which would have been Wall Street had GE not taken it over many years ago) to view some of the buildings that were still in the preliminary stages of construction. We finished the tour by looking at GE's old anechoic chamber. Originally the architects wanted to tear this building down since it was built in the 1950's and its look wasn't what was considered the "ideal look" of the campus (1920's to 1930's era). Plus, the building was simply hard to work with having been designed to stop all reflections of sound waves and with a significant portion of its main floor suspended. GE used this building to see exactly how loud their electric motors were; the designers of Electric Works are hoping it will make a cool restaurant. Some of the challenges the architects had to deal with including getting all plans approved by the National Parks Service (a requirement for some of the Federal historical preservation tax incentives they receive), as well as dealing with the old windows, none of which had a square frame, and all of which included asbestos glazing and calk. A few of the more interesting design features we learned about were the conversion of a former sky-bridge between buildings to a conference room, as well as the inclusion of an all-denominations prayer room open 24-7. No residential spaces are planned for Phase 1, but there will be a farmer's market and beer garden.

While it was hard to imagine exactly how everything would look in it's finished form, it's easy to see that this project will transform GE's old Broadway campus area into a jewel of Fort Wayne, and I am very excited to see how it turns out. 
